Our Youth Program

The Adirondack A's, Model A Club sponsored a Youth Program, in conjunction with the Saratoga Auto Museum, Saratoga, New York. The objective of this program is to get local young people interested in the restoration and preservation antique cars for future generations. Our Youth Program had 14 young people ranging in age from 12 to 16 in the



program. The Saratoga Auto Museum provided a work area, which was open to the museum floor, where museum patrons could watch the restoration in progress.

The youths and Adirondack A's Club members work two days per month on the project car. The chassis was completely stripped; the engine, transmission, front end and rear end were removed. All parts to be reused were cleaned, inspected, rebuilt and painted. The brakes and engine were rebuilt

and the chassis was reassembled. New king pins and spring shackle bushings installed.

The Huckster body, which is made of red oak wood, was assembled on to the chassis.

The Model A Huckster was completed on May 2nd 2010 and was the featured car at the Saratoga Auto Museum's Annual Car Show on May 15 & 16, 2010.

Our club has received national recognition for this youth project and has been reviewed by several national magazines. We had cooperate support from LeBaron Bonney, Bratton's, Restoration Supply, NAPA, Hagerty Insurance and Universal Tire to name a few.



We are in the process of planning our next youth program, which will be the building of a 1929 Speedster.
